Dear Parishioners,

The theme for today's liturgy is "The Word and the Seed". When working in your garden you don't say it loud "may you grow". The words are spoken in the mind. The promises made to the Israelites by God must come true. How? "My word shall not return to me void, but shall do my will, achieving the end for which I sent it" (Is 55:11). The prophet's hearers were to have no doubt about the reliability of God's promise and His prophetic word. Without the rain we cannot guarantee the growth of the crop in the garden. The food that comes from God's work is a source of life. Isaiah's image of God's word as seed prepares us for the gospel parable of the sower (Mk 13:1-23, Mk 4:1-20, Lk 8:5-15).

The Psalm (Ps 65:10,11,12-13,14) is a thanksgiving hymn for the end of drought. It links the Isaiah passage which compares God's word to rain and Paul's reflections about my place of creation in the divine plan (Rm 8:18-23).

As a farmer waits for the rain so are we to wait for the glory of God. Suffering is no deterrent to our hope for "affliction produces endurance" (Rom 5:3). The spirit which the believer possesses at the present time is but the "first Fruits" (Rom 8:23) of the final deliverance and redemption still in store for the totality of God's creation. Paul today reminds us of humanity's continuing responsibility and stewardship for creation (Gn 1:28). God used word to bless man.

The parable of the sower going out to sow represents the experience of Jesus himself preaching in Galilee. The various soils describe those who heard the word, which is His message and how they failed to grasp His message.

The question of why Jesus should speak to them in parables arose because of the hostile neighbors who rejected Jesus' ministry and the message of His followers had unknowingly fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah (Jn 12:40, Acts 26:36-27). According to Mark, Jesus' own disciples consistently misunderstood the teaching of Jesus (Mk 8:14-21).

In the explanation of the parable, we read of the struggle of Matthew's church and of churches of every age. Many today fall away because of failure to understand their faith. Will you also go away? Why go away? Peter answers for you "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life" (Jn 6:68). Some of us ignore the need to apply our heads as well as our hearts to our religion and its teachings. Others are on the childhood level of never having roots, while others are so fascinated by wealth or so driven hard by the pressures of life (at times blaming God) that their faith goes the way of the seed among thorns and is choked.

Besides all else you cannot keep the faith without updating yourself. What yearly medical digest does to medical doctors is what reading the bible or attending its class and the adult education class should do to you together with paying attention to the liturgy of the word during Mass and other liturgical celebrations. As we say in Ibo Nigeria, *GOOD WINE NEEDS NO BUSH*. That is to say that the word of God is not to be thrown away.

I may not have this golden opportunity to put my reflections on your Sunday Bulletin since I am leaving you for Nigeria on August 14th, please God.

You have all been instrumental to enlivening my faith. As a Catholic Priest, I will always remember you at the Altar. Thanks for accepting me. I now have you as the mother parish to my parish that is only 16 years old..



Living the Liturgy

The Sower and the Seed

The readings this weekend are more tightly related than usual. The Isaiah reading images the word of God as a powerful and life-giving, as effective as the rain and snow, so essential for anything to grow. "My word shall not return to me void, but shall do my will, achieving the end for which I sent it." In Hebrew, the term for "word," dabar, though a noun, is an action word like a verb. The word carries out what it stands for. Though this may be difficult for us to grasp, it is worth the effort, especially when we consider Jesus as the Word of God for us, as the gospel of John proclaims. "The Word was made flesh, he lived among us." (John 1.15) Jesus isn't just the presence of God incarnate, but does the deeds of Yahweh in his welcoming of the outcast and profligate invitation to all to enter God's kingdom. In the parable of the sower and the seed, the power of the word (the seed) is definitely modified by the condition of the ground (the people) which receives it. (If you saw Godspell, your mind can replay the hilarious scene of this passage being acted out.)

The meaning, of course, is anything but humorous. How open are we as individuals, families, a community, to hearing the word of God? With most of us having had so little religious education as adults, do we even recognize that the scriptures have something to say to us today? Do we try to understand the readings at Mass by looking them over the week before, so that we become "rich soil" that can produce fruit in the way we live? Do we ever read the Psalms and let them express our feelings of joy or sadness or trust in God? How are we doing passing on our love for the faith, for the Eucharist, for the Church and its people with all our failings and limitations? Can we be as generous with our love and compassion as the Sower is, offering forgiveness and a new start? Why not take some time this week to reflect on the readings for the coming week? Ask the Spirit to enlighten you to hear the word with an open heart that it may continue to bear fruit in your life. Peace, S. Sheral

From Our Bishops

"As people of faith, we are convinced that 'the earth is the Lord's and all it holds' (Ps 24:1).
