Dear Parishioners,

Have you been to Yosemite or Yellowstone Park? Were you fortunate enough to have seen the Grand Canyon? Do you still smile as you approach Lake Tahoe? Perhaps, you grew up going to the beach, to the mountains or to the country where relatives lived. This natural world which refreshes us by its beauty desperately needs our help. Our Native American ancestors say that before you make a decision, you must consider the effect of that decision on the seventh generation to come. We are being invited to embrace that same mindset.

Beginning this weekend and throughout the month of October, our parish Social Concerns group will be helping us to respond to the encouragement by the Holy Father and our bishops to take the St. Francis Pledge to Care for Creation and the Poor. It would be easier to ignore the repeated admonitions of our best scientists and the fears of low-lying island dwellers, but our faith tells us we cannot do this. Ironically, those countries which have contributed the least to global warming will be the first to be drastically impacted. The intensity of hurricanes and bizarre weather patterns, including the major flooding of Metro Manila last weekend cannot be ignored.

St. Francis of Assisi whose feast we celebrate this weekend saw all people and all of creation as his brothers and sisters. His wonder at Brother Sun, Sister Moon and Mother Earth revealed a profound insight: the same God has formed us all. We are called to care for, protect and share this planet and its abundance with all its inhabitants. Each weekend, one of our group will offer some suggestions as to how we can lessen the impact of global climate change. We'll also give each household a card with some reminders as to where we might begin.

Pope John Paul II spoke of us as "cooperators with God in the work of creation."

The St. Francis Pledge appears on the enclosed flier. Please talk it over with members of your family and sign it when you feel ready. Let us enter into this holy task together and with gratitude.



Living the Liturgy

St. Francis, Our Patron

How much do you know about St. Francis? As a Franciscan, it gives me great pleasure to share some aspects of his life with you. He was born in Assisi in 1181, the child of a wealthy cloth merchant, Pietro Bernadone, and his devout wife, Pica. He was spoiled, the life of the party as a young man, and enjoyed being the center of attention. Seeking fame as a knight, he twice went off to war but both times he returned, sick and embarrassed. While he was recuperating the second time, he had a dream in which Jesus asked him, "Is it better to serve the master or the servant?" Francis replied, "The master, of course." "Then why are you serving the servant?" came the reply. Thus began the long, slow process of his conversion.

One day when he was praying, he opened the gospel of Matthew and read, "If you would be perfect, go, sell what you have and come follow me." At last, he knew what he must do! He not only sold what HE had, but also gave away much of his father's inventory. He began begging and wore rags, much to his family's chagrin, as he walked the streets and spoke of Jesus' love for all people. Instead of partying, he spent long hours in prayer. His former companions and most of the townsfolk thought he was crazy. He greeted everyone with "The Lord give you peace."

One day, he had a vision of Jesus on the cross; Jesus said, "Francis, rebuild my church, which as you see is in ruins." The literalist Francis began repairing the decrepit chapels nearby. The example of his life was difficult to ignore and, little by little, other men came to help with the work and to live with him. Eventually, he realized that the vision meant to repair not church buildings, but the Church as the People of God. His life of poverty was in great contrast to the luxury in which many of the clergy of that time lived.

His commitment to God and to the poor deepened when he encountered a leper. He was moved to embrace the leper and later described the incident as "sweet." He crossed other barriers as well. He went to visit the Sultan in the midst of the Fifth Crusade after he had tried to persuade the crusaders to stop fighting. Though the crusades continued, he and the Sultan spent nearly a month in conversation and prayer together, long before anyone even imagined interfaith dialogue.

We who are Franciscans – the friars (who founded the California Missions), the Poor Clares (who live a contemplative, cloistered life), many women's communities (like mine, founded many years after his death), and Third Order Franciscans (often married men and women) also try to follow Christ and live his gospel. May you do the same in your life! *Peace, S. Sheral*
