WEEKLY READINGS

LIVING THE LITURGY

Easter Faith

It took a while for the early followers of the Way to grasp Jesus' resurrection and it might be the same for us. In the Vigil gospel from Luke's community, the women the same faithful ones who stood by his cross when the men had fled - come to anoint his body according to Jewish custom. After all he had endured, did someone now steal his body, another tragedy for his family and those who loved him? The angels remind them of his words to them about rising on the third day and they remember. They tell what they have experienced to the apostles but "they did not believe them." But Peter did - he runs to the tomb, sees it empty and goes home amazed. On Easter, the gospel from John's community tells a similar story, with Peter and John responding to Mary Magdalen's distress that someone has stolen the body. "They saw and believed, for they did not understand the scripture that he had to rise from the dead." It takes a while for us, too, to grasp that our times of struggle and pain will also be followed by new life, some type of resurrection. I was in a rather strange conversation last month with a self-proclaimed atheist who called religion a ridiculous excuse people have made up to help them deal with what they don't understand. I told him that I believed in God because of my experiences of God. Our conversation abruptly ended when it became evident that he had no interest in what I was saying. But isn't this the bottom line? That we know God is because we've experienced his love for us, often through a spouse or parents or children or a good friend? And this is the mystery of Jesus' life, death and resurrection. As Sr. Barbara Reid says, "It is not obedience to a father who wills his son to die – for what parent would ever wish such a fate on a child? Rather, Jesus' obedience is to divine love for all humanity and to the prophetic mission to release all who are bound by sin and suffering, bringing jubilee freedom to all. It is a costly love that impels him." (America, March 22, 2010) May our Easter joy send us forth, ready to share that "costly love" with those who need it! S. Sheral

From Archbishop Niederauer A response to current news reports

Catholics are understandably concerned about news reports that seek to implicate Pope Benedict XVI in the sexual abuse scandals in the Church. Archbishop Timothy Dolan of New York, at Mass on Palm Sunday in St. Patrick's Cathedral, directly addressed these reports. The following are excerpts from his insightful remarks:

"The somberness of Holy Weeks is intensified for Catholics this year."

"The recent tidal wave of headlines about abuse of minors by some few priests, this time in Ireland, Germany, and a re-run of an old story from Wisconsin, has knocked us to our knees once again."

"Anytime, this horror, vicious sin, and nauseating crime is reported, as it needs to be, victims and their families are wounded again, and the vast majority of faithful priests bow their heads in shame anew, and sincere Catholic experience another dose of shock, sorrow, and even anger.

"What deepens the sadness now is the unrelenting insinuations against the Holy Father himself, as certain sources seem frenzied to implicate the man who, perhaps more than anyone else, has been the leader in purification, reform, and renewal that the Church so needs."

"Sunday Mass is hardly the place to document the inaccuracy, bias, and hyperbole of such aspersions."

"But, Sunday Mass is indeed the time for Catholics to pray for...Benedict our Pope."

"And Palm Sunday Mass is sure a fitting place for us to express our love and solidarity for our earthly shepherd now suffering some of the same unjust accusations, shouts of the mob, and scourging at the pillar, as did Jesus."

"No one has been more vigorous in cleansing the Church of the effects of this sickening sin that the man we now call Pope Benedict XVI. The dramatic progress that the Catholic Church in the United States has made-documented again just last week by the report made by independent forensic auditors-could never have happened without the insistence and support of the very man now being daily crowned with thorns by groundless innuendo."

"Does the Church and her Pastor, Pope Benedict XVI, need intense scrutiny and just criticism for tragic horrors long past?"

"Yes! He himself has asked for it, encouraging complete honesty, at the same time expressing contrition, and urging a thorough cleansing."

"All we ask is that it be fair, and that the Catholic Church not be singled-out for a horror that has cursed every culture, religion, organization, institution, school, agency, and family in the world."

Please pray for Pope Benedict XVI, for the Catholic Church throughout the world, and for healing for all those who have suffered from sexual abuse.
