#### Dear Friends,

I sit here in Gene's chair, sipping my Vanilla Chai tea, a gift from my good friends Joan and Tony. Gene would enjoy this unusual pungent, sweet flavor. I read aloud the scripture for today and say to Gene: "Honey, I need your help. These seem to be very negative readings. Please help me make sense of them." I close my eyes and wait. The thought comes to me: "Ask the Holy Spirit; He will help you understand."

Again I recite aloud the reading from Isaiah. These words stand out: "I know their works and their thoughts...they shall proclaim my glory." God, my Father, cares about what I am thinking and what I am doing. I am His precious child. I am important to Him. I need to proclaim His glory by praising Him and giving Him thanks for all He has done for me.

Next I come to St. Paul's letter to the Hebrews: "At the time, all discipline seems a cause not for joy but for pain, yet later it brings the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who are trained by it. So strengthen your drooping hands and your weak knees. Make straight paths for your feet, that what is lame may not be disjointed but healed." Discipline doesn't mean punishment though sometimes it really does feel like punishment; discipline means to be taught. The grief I now experience brings me closer to Jesus and it is teaching me how God wants me to live the rest of my life. St. Paul's words bring healing to me and the hope that some day Gene and I will be together in God's kingdom.

Next I study the reading from the Gospel of Luke. These words are rather frightening. Jesus' advice is: "Strive to enter through the narrow gate." Where is this narrow gate? How do I find it? How do I enter through it? I sit quietly for several minutes, waiting for an answer.

The narrow gate is the straight pathway that enables me to focus on my God----on His love for me and on my love for Him. This narrow gate helps me to clear my head of the many distractions that surround me and discover the meaning of life---Jesus lives within me. He asks only that I earnestly seek Him; come to know Him by reading and reflecting upon His Word and then living it. Once I truly come to know Jesus, I become His friend and He becomes mine. Together we share an intimate personal relationship. I bring to Him my deepest thoughts, sorrows and joys. In loving Jesus, I cannot help but grow in love for all "my brothers and sisters from all nations". When I finally pass through the narrow gate which leads to heaven and knock upon the door, I need not be afraid. Jesus will recognize me and know where I am from. He will welcome me and invite me in.

Together let us journey through this narrow gate. Then, with those we love who have gone before us, we will recline at table in the Kingdom of God.

#### All Are Welcome!

The readings today describe a development in the Jewish people's understanding of how God works. While they are still the Chosen People, God wants to save not only them, but invites everyone "to Jerusalem," symbolizing the center of Jewish observance and the City of God, heaven. Their experience was probably like ours with Vatican II expanding our sense of who will go to heaven from only Catholics to all people of good will who seek God and try to live moral lives. It is these foreigners, non-Jews, who will bring back the Jews from exile, using every possible conveyance!

The person asking who will be saved in the gospel assumes it will be few, perhaps, like the Left Behind series of books which declare the same un-Christian message. Luke's gospel, has Jesus reiterating this broader sense of God's desire to include everyone to "recline at table in the kingdom of God." Jesus says we must "Strive to enter through the narrow gate." The verb in Greek is one used to describe athletic training, so God's desire for us must elicit daily disciplined exercise on our part. "Hanging out" with Jesus, just hearing him preach doesn't cut it! That would be like going to the gym to watch others work out instead of doing it ourselves. So what does our daily spiritual practice include? Do we thank God for the gift of life? Ask for guidance during the day? Pray before meals? Reflect on how we've been an instrument of God's love at evening: Have we been as inclusive as God in our interactions? None of us has arrived and, fortunately for us, it's never too late to begin!

# YOU CAN BE AN ANGEL AND OUR PARISH CAN BE A HOST OF ANGELS

The Gabriel Project is an Archdiocesan parish-based ministry to support pregnant mothers and their unborn children. We recognize the importance and value of this ministry and would like our parish to take part in it. Your help is needed to accomplish our goal. We hope that the following information will interest you in attending an informational meeting to learn more about this ministry and how our parish can participate.

A pregnant mother might feel alone, frightened and overwhelmed by her new challenges. She might need a friend she can depend on and trust; one who will walk beside her along her new journey. She might be concerned about her and her child's future. We want her to know that we are people who care about her and want to help her. If she has been abandoned by family or her child's father, our parish community can lovingly help her overcome her sense of loss and loneliness by welcoming her as family and friend.

In the Gospel of Luke, the Angel Gabriel told Mary the good news that a child would be born and that she was to be the Mother of our Savior. When she asked, "How can this be?" the angel told her not to be afraid for "nothing is impossible with God." The Gabriel Project announces the same comforting message to frightened pregnant mothers: Fear not, for God is with you! Nothing is impossible with God.

We would like to join the Archdiocesan Gabriel team by welcoming client referrals from the Gabriel Helpline to our parish. Whenever we would receive a referral to a pregnant mother, one of our parish volunteers ("Gabriel Angel") would be assigned to maintain ongoing contact with her throughout her pregnancy. Our parish Angel would assess her needs and through prayer and action our parish community would assure her that she has their love and the love of Christ by providing her with spiritual, emotional and material support to help meet those needs.

There are also various opportunities for Assistant Angels to provide help on a more ilmited basis. In whatever way they help all volunteers and the parish community act as the Body of Christ and bring love and hope to pregnent mothers through their acts of kindness.

By employing our individual talents, collaborating with various ministries in the parish or diocese and utilizing community resources, we stand ready to provide a mother with the kinds of assistance she needs.

The Gabriel Project is a marvelous way to show our community that we Catholics see in the conception of each child a fresh expression of God's unfailing love. That we care about pregnant mothers in need and that there is no reason for any mother within our boundaries to feel that she is helpless and alone.
