Dear Parishioners,

I sit here on our deck, sipping Earl Grey tea. I am warmed by the Autumn sun while breathing in the sweet fragrance of jasmine. 

Living Liturgy

Always Our Children

When we hear this reading on Thanksgiving Day we're reminded of the outcast status of lepers in Jesus' time. They were shunned, lived in isolation, and were considered sinners whose physical deformities were judged as evidence of wrongdoing. People who are gay or lesbian today often experience the shunning, exclusion and isolation which lepers felt in Jesus' time.

This past month, Tyler Clementi, a freshman at Rutgers University, jumped off a bridge after a roommate and his friend made a streaming video of him in a compromising situation. Lest we think this a rare occurrence, last month 13-year-old Asher Brown of Texas shot himself to death after enduring relentless taunting at his middle school. Here in California, 13-year-old Seth Walsh hanged himself when he couldn't take the bullying any longer — as did Billy Lucas, 15, in Indiana. All of these young men either were gay or were perceived to be gay. There is much we don't understand about sexuality. But some psychologists propose a continuum between heterosexual attraction/orientation and homosexual attraction/orientation and that each of us falls somewhere in between. While there is one school of thought which contends that one's orientation can be changed, the majority of experts disagree. No one knows what causes homosexuality; persons with this orientation say that they have known since an early age that they were "different."

In 1997, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops published a pastoral message, "Always Our Children," for parents of homosexual children and pastoral ministers. The authors describe it as "an outstretched hand of the bishops...offering them a fresh look at the grace present in family life and the unfailing mercy of Christ our Lord." The document explores the range of feelings family members may experience and offers suggestions for holding the tension between love for one's child and recognition of the Church's teachings. If you have a family member, friend or colleague whom you think may be gay or lesbian, you might want to read the entire document which you can find online. My older sister is lesbian, so I have a unique and personal understanding of the challenges faced by someone who is "different" in this way.

If we can heed the closing lines of the bishops' message, we can help prevent future tragedies:

"All in all, it is essential to recall one basic truth. God loves every person as a unique individual. Sexual identity helps to define the unique persons we are, and one component of our sexual identity is sexual orientation. Thus, our total personhood is more encompassing than sexual orientation...God does not love someone any less simply because he or she is homosexual. God's love is always and everywhere offered to those who are open to receiving it."
