Dear Parishioners:

The film "Real Women Have Curves" gives us a glimpse of the persistent, unquenchable faith of Latino women. The film takes place in East Los Angeles, a mainly Latino community. In one of the scenes Ana's godmother comes to visit Ana's mother in the kitchen. She is chatting away about life. Soon Ana's mother is complaining-that Ana doesn't help in the house, she goes out, has no husband, wants to go to Columbia University. The film shows how far this Latino mother will go for the safety she wants for her daughter, setting aside a feminist critique of valuing a daughter for the man she marries. In our 21st century, persistence is a faltering virtue. Yet human dignity demands we persist in the struggle for universal human rights. Mothers persist in praying for their daughters' well-being.

Jesus' parables always begin with ordinary people like Ana's mother and ordinary situations. Parables invite ordinary people beyond the ordinary; they throw us back into recognizing our fundamental relationship to mystery. We can miss the power of Sunday's parable if we don't place ourselves in the context of Luke's community. The widow's story and her voice demanding her rights would perk up the ears of Luke's original listeners. The poor widow represents the helpless and abandoned of the world; she has no legal rights without a husband. She lives at the mercy of those who ought to protect her. Jesus is a new Moses whose outstretched arms bring us all closer to God on our perilous journeys. Our journeys to freedom come through struggle. faithfulness with God assures victory and saves us from losing heart. The poor of the world seem victims of the powerful, pawns of the almighty. Yet our heritage is one of a hope that comes through faith in the goodness of God.



Persistence for Justice

This weekend's gospel has a strong message, couched in an almost humorous parable. Can you imagine a powerful judge finally giving a just judgment to a seemingly powerless widow for fear that she'll give him a black eye? Her husband's brother should have been coming to plead her cause according to their culture, but she must come on her own, persistently badgering this man who "neither feared God nor respected any human being." This is a wonderful reminder for all of us who plead the cause of those in need of any kind – God will see that justice is done, though it may not be according to our timeline!

As you know, October is "Respect Life Month." You might recall that Cardinal Bernardin of Chicago used to speak of respect for life as a "seamless garment." If we are indeed pro-life, we need to be pro-life on all issues. The California Conference of Bishops has stated, "We are compelled to teach a consistent ethic of life and to speak publicly that the use of the death penalty does not protect human life, does not promote human dignity, and does not reduce violence in our society." As the use of DNA evidence has proven, often those on death row are innocent, even if they've been identified in a line-up. The way in which the imposition of the death penalty is imposed is also unfair: half of all homicide victims are people of color, yet nearly 90% of people executed were convicted of killing whites. During the past eight years, 22 persons with mental disabilities have been executed. Recently, North Caroline's biased State Bureau of Investigation has been found responsible for the unjust execution of four innocent men. In addition, due to the appeals process, it is also much cheaper to lock someone up for life imprisonment without the possibility of parole.

"In his encyclical <u>The Gospel of Life</u>, Pope Benedict XVI called us to choose being 'unconditionally pro-life' and to 'proclaim, celebrate and serve the Gospel of life in every situation.' In every situation--even for a guilty murderer on death row. The dignity of human life must never be taken away; even when someone has committed unspeakable evil...We need to call on our state and federal government to seek other methods in dealing with violent crime." (Jude Siciliano, OP *First Impressions*, Oct. 3, 2010)

If we are trying to live the values we hear every Sunday in the gospel, then we need to reach out in support to the families of the perpetrators as well as the families of the victims. How heartbreaking for both families when a violent crime is committed! Surely, they must feel as poor and helpless as the widow we read about today. Let us pray for all involved in the criminal justice system that just decisions may be rendered and that healing may take place. **Peace, S. Sheral**
