Dear Parishioners,

The Lord is kind and merciful, slow to anger, and relenting in punishment. Jesus came to save us from our sins. He gives everyone more than a second chance. Being human, we find it surprising who Jesus saves. It is usually someone we would not want to be saved. We would rather see that person condemned to death.

This was the case with Zacchaeus in today's gospel passage from Luke. Zacchaeus was a chief tax collector and a wealthy one. His wealth came at the expense of his own Jewish people. He skimmed from the top. He took money that was not really his. People knew this. They despised Zacchaeus and what he did to them. There was nothing that they could do. They were at his mercy. The Jewish people consequently considered Zacchaeus a traitor, a cheater, and a betrayer. They were stunned and perplexed when Jesus told Zacchaeus that he was going to his home. Jesus was going to the home of a terrible sinner.

What was even more shocking was when Jesus proclaimed that salvation has come to Zacchaeus' home. He and his whole family will be saved. The crowd was probably asking themselves how Jesus could do such a thing. Why would he save someone like Zacchaeus? Zacchaeus does not deserve to be saved. A righteous person would not associate with a wretched sinner like Zacchaeus.

Jesus always does things that are contrary to human thinking. He does what we would not do. Jesus saves the worst of the sinners. He sees the good we fail to see in those we dislike. He loves the person we despise and wish ill of. Jesus goes after the lost sheep we do not want back in the fold. The heart of Jesus is open and full of unconditional love while our hearts are closed and stubborn. The Lord is forever forgiving us. From Jesus' perspective everyone is worth saving. You and I need to be saved too, for we have sinned as well. Jesus saves us by loving and forgiving us more than just once. He loves and forgives us always.



RESPECT LIFE MONTH

Who Is Lost?

Who doesn't know the story of Zacchaeus? We can surely identify with him as we strain to see someone famous in person or wonder if we'll recognize anyone at the Giants game. As if we didn't get the point of last week's gospel, today we hear of Jesus again offering salvation to a tax collector, coming "to seek out and save what was lost." How Zacchaeus' life must have changed once he welcomed Jesus!

There are many groups of people who are lost through no fault of their own; in one of these groups are those women and children who are trafficked, who are either kidnapped or taken from their families under false pretenses with an offer of a comfortable job as a nanny or housekeeper in a well-to-do household in a wealthy country. Imagine the dilemma of a very poor family who are offered what seems like a wonderful opportunity for a better life for their child. The trafficker can be someone from their village whom they know and trust, but he then forges documents and sells the child to someone who makes the child work long hours with little or no pay and subject to terrible living conditions.

One of the professors at the University of San Francisco, David Batstone, teaches a class in which his students stake out places in the City where he feels there trafficking victims. His website. www.notforsale.org contains stories about trafficked people and gives suggestions as to how you can recognize the signs of possible trafficking. There is also an effort afoot to encourage hotel managers to be attentive to trafficking possibly taking place in their establishments. If you travel and would like a letter to present to the manager of your hotel, please e-mail me at sheralmar@aol.com and I'll send you a copy. As we conclude our Respect Life Month, let us pray for those who are enslaved in many countries, including our own.

With the coming of All Souls Day this week, you are invited to bring a photo or memorial card of your loved ones who have died to Mary's alcove. You might also want to set up a table in your home with a photo of someone you love and put flowers or some object special to him or her in front of it. Why not invite family members of friends to share stories about this beloved person "who has gone before us marked with the sign of faith"? It would be wonderful for the children or grandchildren in your household to experience the fact that those we love who have died are not forgotten, but live on in our hearts. They are not lost to us; they have simply gone to God before us. May our loving God grant peace to them and to us.
