Dear Parishioners,

"Turn the other cheek; walk the extra mile; give to everyone who asks." These are Jesus' imperatives in Today's gospel. One day in a high school religion class, we talked about this gospel. Students asked hard questions. Should they as a rule, give money to people who are begging on the streets, especially if they suspect the money will be used for alcohol or drugs? Is a Christian also necessarily a pacifist?

A class discussion raised questions about how to respond to Jesus' directive "Give to anyone who begs from you" The students hear Jesus' summons to lend to the beggar with an open heart. They consider everything they have saved to help the poor. Vocations to ministry and service evolve from moments such as these that touch us with the needs of others and awaken us that we can make a difference.

One of Jesus' teachings in today's gospel asks a commitment of self giving like his own. Jesus rejects conventional wisdom and accepted cultural values. He wants us to make neighbors even of enemies. We want to insulate ourselves from the needs and threats around us. We must reflect and act on how to live the gospel.

In the gospel Jesus asks us to take God as our standard in how to treat others. God makes the sun shine and rain fall on the just and unjust alike. In this Jesus goes beyond the golden rule which he quotes later in the sermon on the mount "In everything do unto others as you would have them do unto you." To respond to our enemies and evil with conscious, gracious, undeserved compassion goes farther. This is how life-giving, loving, merciful God acts.

So what can we say about Jesus' exhortations to be perfect as God is perfect. One scripture scholar suggests that a better translation of the word perfect would be fully alive. When one is fully alive, one is whole and able to love.



Living Liturgy

The Sermon on the Mount

At first glance, both the Leviticus reading and the gospel passage seem impossible to live out. Be perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect? Cherish no grudge? Love your enemy? Jesus has to be kidding! Yet in the past few weeks, we've witnessed oppressed people taking these directives Did you notice that when pro-Mubarak forces attacked the protesters on camels and horses that the protesters remained non-violent? Two long weeks into the protest, anxiously awaiting the promised stepping down by the president, there was still no violence when he announced he would continue. This huge group of Muslims, Coptic (Eastern rite) Catholics and others had committed themselves to non-violence and their faithfulness to that stance won them the admiration of the world. The Muslims' faithfulness to prayer in the midst of the protest, directly in front of the army's tanks - showed such great trust in God. The prayers of the entire global community, no doubt, strengthened them as well. After so many years of living under dictatorship, "Raise your head high and be proud to be Egyptian!" became their common cry. Commentators had stated that it was a leaderless group, but surely there had to have been many esteemed and influential leaders to have inspired and sustained a non-violent response in the face of murder, jailings and beatings.

Actually, the Greek verb antistenai, translated as "offer no resistance" in today's gospel is better translated as "do not retaliate against the evildoer." And this was the protesters' response; they did not act with violence. And in each of the four examples, as Barbara Reid, OP, points out, Jesus gives a way to respond "with an action that confronts the evildoer nonviolently, thus breaking the cycle of violence and opening up a new possibility." (I have a wonderful article which I'll gladly share with anyone interested which explains all the gospel examples in detail with their cultural significance.) The admonition to the debtor to hand over not just his outer tunic, but the undergarment of his cloak is a great example of what Jesus is advocating. The poor man would then stand naked in court, shocking everyone and, in that culture, bringing shame on the one who viewed the man's nakedness rather than on the man himself! Similarly, the law allowed a Roman soldier to press a local resident to carry his pack for one mile, but the soldier would be punished for allowing the man to carry it two miles! So, Jesus wants us to respond to evil with creativity, turning the tables on the one using power unjustly. And the phrase about being perfect? It would be better translated as completeness or fullness, just as God's love for us is complete, knowing no bounds. We can only come close to loving as God has loved us with the help of the Holy Spirit! So let us pray for the change of heart we'll need.


