Dear Parishioners,

People in love spontaneously desire the good of the other. Their own preferences are forgotten. What is important is that they try to please the other. As long as the beloved is pleased they don't mind doing things that they would not have liked to do. Why? It is because things look different when the beloved is present.

This is also true not only for lovers but also in instances where there is true love. For example, in a close knit family, children spontaneously obey their parents because they know that what the parents ask of them is an expression of parental love. The same is true with intimate friends. It also applies to the relationship between superiors and subordinates, teachers and students, employers and employees. When the relationship is good, when the person wielding the authority is caring and sensitive then obedience follows naturally as it were. The reason is because love is fundamentally a union of heart and mind. If I am united with someone in mind and heart then I would want what that someone wants. That's human psychology. That is the way we humans are made. It's as simple as that.

The words of Jesus in today's gospel reflect this truth. He says, "If you love me then you will obey my commandments. You are my friends if you obey my commandments." And we know that his commandment is all about loving God and loving others. So if we put Jesus at the center of our lives, if we follow his example by adopting his judgments and values then we love God. If we serve our neighbors according to our situation in life: as a parent, a son or daughter, a spouse, a friend, a relative, a neighbor, an employer or employee, a work mate, we are loving our brothers and sisters. Doing this proves our being disciples of Jesus and so we can say that we truly love him. Note that our love for him is not a sentimental love, made up of nice feelings. It is a strong, efficient love, made up of practical obedience to his wishes.



From the desk of the Pastor **Parish Pastoral Council**



What do pastoral councils actually do? Pope Paul VI has described the purpose of a pastoral council: to examine and consider all that relates to pastoral work and to offer practical conclusions on these matters, so that the life and activity of the People of God may be brought into greater conformity with the Gospel. In this description,

we find three tasks assigned to the pastoral council: to examine, to consider, and to recommend.

To examine. Notice, first, that the object of the pastoral council's examination, "pastoral work" is left sufficiently unspecified in order to include all that concerns the pastor and his staff in serving the parish. The council identifies issues and studies them either at the request of the pastor or on its own initiative.

To consider. The pastoral council certainly considers the data it has collected from its examination by trying to discern in what direction God is inviting the parish to go, what is behind the data.

To recommend. After the pastoral council has examined and considered any pastoral work, it now makes a recommendation to the pastor and his staff on what should be done for this parish at this time in its history.

From the description of the work of the pastoral council, the word that best summarizes its activity is planning. A look at the many sides of planning now follows. Planning, first of all, involves the future of the parish. Where are we being asked to go as a parish by the Scripture, by Vatican II, by current Papal and Episcopal teaching? Where are we being asked to go to meet the present and future needs of the parish?

From attempting to answer these questions, the pastoral council is ready to embrace side two of planning: the creation of a parish vision. Councils help the pastor and his staff see the needs of the parish: be they better liturgy, greater hospitality, more effective religious education, outreach to seniors.

After the vision of parish needs has been created, the council next prioritizes them. With limited resources of personnel and budget, each parish can only do so much. Thus, it is crucial for the council to put the needs of the parish in an order of importance. When the parish needs have been listed and prioritized, then the council begins the work described for it by Canon Law. That task is to study how to meet those needs. The good council investigates the parish situation. It parishioners and examines what the experts say about it. It considers various options and the cost of each. It learns all it can about the matter under consideration.

Now the council is able to make its recommendations to the pastor and his staff and the council's work is completed. The work of implementation can now begin. This task belongs to the pastor and his staff and to those they invite to participate in this effort. Should council members be asked to help, they are, strictly speaking, no longer working as pastoral council members.

The Eucharistic Prayer

The Eucharistic Prayer is "the center and summit" of the Mass (GIRM, 78). This is why we are called to lift up our hearts in the opening dialogue of the prayer. It may be helpful to follow the flow of the prayer with the following guide:

- 1. Opening dialogue and Preface Thanksgiving
- 2. Acclamation Holy, holy, holy is the Lord!
- 3. Calling upon the power of God ("epiclesis") -"sanctify these gifts".
- **4. Institution** narrative and consecration –

This is my Blood." 5. Remembering ("anamnesis") — The redemptive power of Christ's Passion, death, resurrection and ascension are made his memory.

"This is my Body.

6. Offering -

offering the "spotless Victim" and ourselves.

7. Intercession – we offer the sacrifice for ourselves and for all the members of Church, living and dead.

8. Final Praise ("doxology") and Assent - "Amen!"

The Eucharistic Prayer is an extended prayer of consecration

Father, we celebrate the present as we celebrate mystery of Christ, your Son. Eucharistic Prayer I (Roman Canon)
