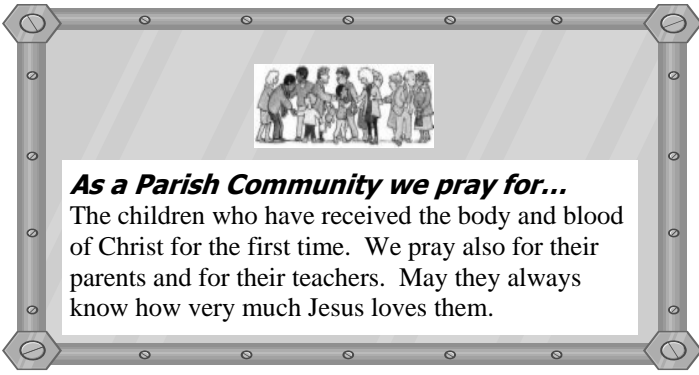

STEWARDSHIP

A New Parish Second Collection

Next weekend there will be a new second collection to assist the parish in covering our assessment to the Archbishop's Annual Appeal. Our assessment must be paid whether or not we reach the goal of our Annual Appeal goal. For the 2008 Annual Appeal we fell almost \$10,000 short of our goal. The parish had to make up this difference from parish funds.

The parish finance committee reviewed the statistics of the campaign. One critical factor was the number of families who participated by making a pledge or a one time gift. Last year only 360 families out of 2221 registered families. This equates to approximately 16% participated in the Archbishop's Appeal.

The parish finance council passed a resolution to institute a quarterly second collection to give the opportunity for more families to participate in the Archbishop's Appeal. This year our assessment is \$98,400. To date we have received pledges and gifts in the amount of \$67,383 from 254 families. Please help us to make our assessment this year.

A LETTER FROM FATHER BRUCE

Dear Friends,

I want to once again thank you for your prayers, support and love. I went almost three weeks without the need for a transfusion. The last time I was in the hospital my doctors tried another medicine which seems to have slowed down the internal bleeding. However, over these past two weeks I have needed four units of blood and two infusions of iron. This past week my doctors decided to restart me on the medicine I had intravenously in the hospital. I will be taking this drug three times a day. If it works, they have a form of the drug which gets administered every twenty eight days. The doctors say that within the next month I will have another scan to look at the tumor in the liver and the blood clot in the portal vein.

I do tire easily and have not been able to do much around the parish except to celebrate Mass and greet people. I would like to thank Father Paul, Father Ring and all the staff for covering for me when, at the last moment, I am unable to do something.

I have spoken to Archbishop Niederauer and Bishop Justice over the past couple of weeks. After a lot of prayer and reflection I have asked them to appoint an administrator to Saint Roberts. I will remain as pastor. The administrator will handle the day to day operations of the parish and will provide another priest to help with funerals and Masses. We have spoken about our parish and the qualities which I feel are necessary for the administrator. The most asked question will be will this person become pastor when I am no longer able to serve in that capacity? Both the Archbishop and Bishop feel that that is not a decision that needs to be made now. The personnel board will be discussing Saint Roberts and making a recommendation to Archbishop Niederauer sometime in the next month.

I am at peace with this decision. It is the right thing for Saint Roberts. Jesus was raised from the dead in order that sin and death may be conquered. I truly trust in God's care for me and in his giving me each day. In a few weeks my classmates and I celebrate thirty-one wonderful years of priestly service. It is a gift for which we are grateful.

May God continue to bless our time together with strong faith and the courage to profess that faith as did the disciples of Jesus throughout the ages.

The Good Shepherd

This Fourth Sunday of Easter has traditionally been an occasion to talk about vocations and, having been a vocation director for almost half of my ministerial life, I can't pass up the opportunity! Who would you like to see leading our parish community in 10 or 20 years? The shortage of priests is well-known, yet I daresay, not many adults ever ask a son or grandson, nephew or neighbor if he has ever considered becoming a priest. Sisters and brothers are also in short supply; I'm the eleventh youngest in our province, having been in the community for 44 years! We are fortunate, of course, to have two wonderful deacons who serve our parish community in many ways. We are blessed, too, with wonderful lay ministers in Yvonne Olcomendy, Joanne Bartolotti, and all the generous religious education and St. Robert's School teachers, aides, and volunteers, not to mention parishioners who visit the sick, respond to the needs of the poor, organize fundraisers, serve during liturgies, and keep the community spirit alive through the various groups. Undoubtedly, the ranks of lay ministers will continue to grow as more and more people get in touch with their baptismal call to serve, a realization encouraged by Vatican II. And thanks be to God for that!

But do we really WANT religious and priests and deacons for the future? If we do, we need to remember that they will come from families and parishes like our own. We don't grow on trees! Obviously, at this point in the church's life, celibacy is a requirement for priesthood and religious life and that is a major obstacle for some people. If you know someone whom you think MIGHT be interested, why not have him or her talk with one of us on staff? Sometimes, the strange misconceptions young people (and their parents) have would discourage any normal, healthy person from even considering these lifestyles. We will share honestly the joys and challenges of our vocations, so the person can make an informed choice. Peace, S. Sheral
