Dear Friends,

Two Sundays ago we started taking our Gospel readings from St. John. From Today's Gospel readings-Jn6:41-51-our theme is food for the journey.

During the summer we make preparations for our journey. On my part I had to put my passport first in my suit case before any other things. In the first reading (1kgs 19:4) Elijah went a day's journey into the desert. Mine took me 13 and 1/2 hours from Lagos Nigeria to Atlanta, Georgia and 5 hours 5 minutes from Atlanta to San Francisco. (It was not a relaxing flight. It took 3 days for my ears to function well again.) While Elijah prayed for death saying "This is enough, O Lord!! Take my life, for I am not better than my father." (1kgs 19:4) I prayed for life saying "God keep me safe to St. Roberts to meet Msgr. Bruce Dreier and his good parishioners, make my stay a happy one and lead me back to my parish St. Theresa of the child Jesus Akaeze Nigeria."

There are people in the world today who are seriously praying for death while others are praying for survival and life. My father told me the story of a sick man who was a burden to his family for his illness became terminal due to swollen belly and legs. The only Euthanasia was to dump him in the evil forest to die. This they did! Here comes a man with a rope to the evil forest looking up at what branch of tree to commit suicide by hanging himself. Inadvertently he stumbled into the abandoned man who asked what he brought him to the forest disturbing his peace. He looked closely at the swollen man wondering how he had disturbed his peace. He added "don't disturb me for I still hope for life." At this he said to himself, "If the abandoned man still looks for life why hang himself." He dropped the rope and went home. See how the man became a lesson for the one who wanted suicide.

Our Journey on earth is full of ups and downs. God knows what we need for every journey. Elijah leaves behind all that he knew in embarking on a sacred journey. His words are words of deep frustration. He had killed the prophets of Ball-(kgs18:21-40) and does not understand why his life would now be at risk.

We need food for our journey. Thanks to the angel who brought food to Elijah. He walked forty days and forty nights to Mt. Horeb where Moses had met God (Ex. 19). When we went to the Holy Lands it took us 6 hours to climb Mt. Horeb.

Our journey to heaven should be the concern of every Christian. The letter to the Ephesians, our second reading, is concerned most of all with the church. Elsewhere Paul calls each believe a temple of the Holy Spirit-(Corb:19). In Ephesians the whole church is temple of the Holy Spirit. An offence against the church is an offence against the spirit. Today's second reading Eph. 4:30-32 is like Col 3:12-13. " Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, heart felt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another; as the Lord has forgiven you, so must you also do."

STEWARDSHIP

Second Collection For Annual Appeal Sunday, August 23rd

There will be a second collection to assist the parish in covering our assessment to the Archbishop's Annual Appeal. Our assessment must be paid whether or not we reach the goal of our Annual Appeal goal. For the 2008 Annual Appeal we fell almost \$10,000 short of our goal. The parish had to make up this difference from parish funds.

The parish finance committee reviewed the statistics of the campaign. One critical factor was the number of families who participated by making a pledge or a one time gift. Last year only 360 families out of 2221 registered families. This equates to approximately 16% participated in the Archbishop's Appeal.

The parish finance council passed a resolution to institute a quarterly second collection to give the opportunity for more families to participate in the Archbishop's Appeal. This year our assessment is \$98,400. To date we have received pledges and gifts in the amount of \$84,770.26 from 423 families. Please help us to make our assessment this year.

Living the Liturgy

The Mystery of Death and Suffering

When I gave a reflection at the Marian Medical Center fundraiser in Santa Maria recently, I included a prayer for the 19 year old son of one of our doctors who had just died in a bicycle accident with a car driven by one of his classmates. And the 32 year old sister of one of the sisters I live with spent the night at our home with her husband after her first day of chemotherapy at Stanford for aggressive t-cell cancer. Their sister has just been diagnosed with breast cancer. We all know and love people who have died before their time or with life-threatening illnesses and we ask "Why?" Perhaps, as Californians, these undeserved tragedies are especially difficult for us to understand. With all our technological advances, we should be immune to such hardships! We can easily take for granted the gifts of good health and of life itself which really **are** gifts, though we may not often reflect on that fact. Unconsciously, we may harbor the attitude that we don't deserve the sufferings which afflict the rest of the population. With our American propensity for ignoring whatever is unpleasant, our society encourages us to avoid mentioning, much less acknowledging the more painful realities of life.

And as Catholics, how do we respond to the suffering and death of loved ones? We cannot ignore the pain their situation brings us nor how much we miss the person who is no longer with us. And surely, we can cry out to God in our confusion and sorrow. We have only to remember Jesus' response when he heard that his friend Lazarus had died and saw the sorrow of their friends. In John 11.33-36, he is moved from deep within and weeps. He has known our sadness and the edge of despair which often comes with the mystery of death. Those of us who've experienced the death of loved ones know how comforting it is to be able to lean on the community. We can help each other by our presence, even though there are no words to take away the grief. In the gospel for this Sunday, Jesus expresses in four different ways that our faith and our reception of the Eucharist lead to eternal life. We are one with our friends and family members in the throes of serious illness; we are also one with those who "have gone before us, marked with the sign of faith." (from Eucharistic Prayer I) We can affirm our faith, even through tears, "Whoever eats this bread will live forever." May the Spirit strengthen our faith in the resurrection of Jesus and of all those we love! Peace,
